The World Water Crisis

No one can survive without water. Yet 663 million people do not have clean, safe water to drink, and 2.4 billion live without adequate sanitation facilities. The lack of these basic necessities isn't just inconvenient — it's lethal. Globally, illnesses caused by unsafe drinking water, lack of sanitation and poor hygiene are a leading cause of death for children under five, contributing to nearly **1,000 deaths a day**.

The UNICEF Tap Project

The UNICEF Tap Project is a nationwide campaign driving awareness about global water and sanitation issues while raising critical funds that help provide the world's children with access to clean water and basic sanitation. Now in its 10th year, the UNICEF Tap Project has raised nearly **\$6 million** for UNICEF's water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) programs. Now, it's easier than ever to help those in need.

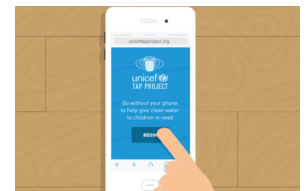
During World Water Month, the UNICEF Tap Project challenges Americans to go without something they take for granted as much as clean water—their cell phones.

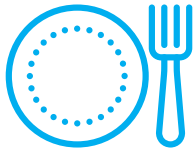
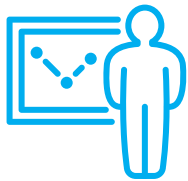
